Examples include:

Cat table boy job

Two cats many tables some boys three jobs

Before a singular countable noun you can use **a/an**:

- There's a table to sit at.
- Do you see a boy there?

You cannot use a singular countable noun alone (without a/an/the/etc.)

- I'm looking for a job (not I'm looking for job.)
- Be careful of the dog (not *Be careful of dog.*)

We use a/an + noun when we want to say what something/someone is or is like:

This is a lovely house!

She's a nice person.

A cat is an animal.

We also use a/an for jobs:

He is a nurse.

She is a firefighter.

We use some with plural countable nouns + some = a number of/a few of (but not exactly how many).

I've read some good books recently.

You can omit "some":

There are eggs in the fridge. (Meaning some eggs)

Uncountable nouns are those things we cannot count. They cannot take the plural form.

Examples include:

Gold blood music excitement

These words cannot take an "s" at the end; for instance, we cannot say "golds" or "musics." They also cannot take numbers. For example, you cannot say "one gold," "two golds," etc.

Before uncountable nouns, you can use the following: The / Some / Any / Much / This/His/her BUT you cannot use a/an.

Examples include:

some gold his blood any music much excitement

You can also use an uncountable noun without an article, such as:

"This necklace is made of gold."

"Blood is red."

Many nouns can be used as countable and uncountable nouns. Usually, there is a difference in meaning:

Paper: Can you give me some paper. (*Meaning some piece of paper*)

Do you have a paper I could read? (*Meaning a newspaper*)

Experience: This job requires experience.

We had a lot of good experiences there.

Hair:	She has lovely hair. (Hair on her head = uncountable)
